#### **1. The context of this prayer and liturgy policy**

‘The celebration of Catholic liturgies and prayers as an integral part of the learning and teaching should enable the school community to become reflective, experience the presence of God and should develop a mature spiritual life.’ (Marcus Stock (2012), Christ at the Centre, Catholic Truth Society, 23.)

Prayer and liturgy in a Catholic school name and celebrates God’s presence in our lives. It is concerned with giving glory, honour, praise and thanks to God. It is our loving response, in word and action, to God’s invitation to enter into a relationship, made possible through the work of Jesus Christ and the witness of the Holy Spirit. At Holy Cross, school prayer, worship and liturgical celebrations are central to the life of our school and our Catholic nature. These allow our pupils and staff to come together to worship God. Whilst we respect the diversity of belief in the world and are committed to the teaching of other faiths; we are dedicated to creating a school which is Christ is the Golden Thread running through all that we do. We encourage the children to experience worship and liturgical celebrations in a relevant, meaningful, and reverent manner. Our Prayer and liturgy takes account of the religious and educational needs of all who share it and is fully inclusive and accessible. All members of our school community ensure that children are provided with opportunities to develop their spirituality and a close relationship



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with God through acts of worship. In developing a deep sense of spirituality, our children are prepared to live out their lives in accordance with their vocation. As an La Sainte Union (LSU) school we also strive to incorporate their mission into everything we do (See appendix 1). We recognise our founder Jean Baptiste Debrabant’s vision that:

**“A Christian based education is a sure hope for the future of religion and society.”**

### 2. Statement of requirement

- The law requires all maintained Catholic schools to provide an act of daily collective worship (prayer and liturgy) for all pupils, including those in the sixth form (Section 70, 1988 Education Act) that is in accordance with the rites, practices, disciplines, and liturgical norms of the Catholic Church (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, schedule 20; Instrument of Government, clause 2). Academies in England are required by their funding agreement and Articles of Association to comply with similar requirements (The Mainstream Academy and Free School: Supplemental Funding Agreement, December 2020; Model Articles for Catholic Academies, February 2019).

The law requires all maintained schools to recognise and respect that parents have the legal right to withdraw their children up to the age of 16 from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1A)). Sixth-form pupils can choose to withdraw themselves from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1B)).

- The school’s provision for prayer and liturgy will fulfil pupils’ entitlement to experience the range of liturgical treasures of the Church, including a shared repertoire of prayers and liturgical music with which pupils in the school will be familiar.

Prayer and liturgy are not designated curriculum time. In the context of the Catholic school, this means that times of prayer and liturgy are not considered to be part of the allocation of curriculum time for Religious Education.

#### **Legal requirements (4.1)**

Within maintained schools and academies, there is a legal requirement for an act of collective worship to take place daily. Those responsible for the governance of schools with a religious character are legally required to ensure that collective worship is provided and is in accordance with the trust deed or religious designation of the school. In Catholic maintained schools and academies, this daily requirement will be fulfilled variedly as described in this Directory. In schools where this legal requirement holds, parents can choose to withdraw their children up to Year 11. In all Catholic schools (maintained,



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academies, independent, non-maintained special, sixth-form colleges), prayer and liturgy are integral to the spiritual life of the school and to pupils’ moral and spiritual development. Taking part in daily prayer and liturgy helps build community cohesion by creating a consistent structure around the core values and symbols of Christianity. Prayer and liturgy are, therefore, an important part of a Catholic school’s distinctive character. They are integral to the Catholic identity and life of the school, and they would take place in all Catholic schools, whether schools were required by statute to provide collective worship. Notably, too, pupil participation and engagement in prayer and liturgy are crucially important criteria in the diocesan inspection of Catholic education. Therefore, we have replaced the term ‘collective worship’ with the phrase ‘prayer and liturgy’, which more fittingly describes its role in a Catholic school. The bishop entrusts his responsibility for prayer and liturgy to the governors and headteachers. It is their responsibility to ensure that it is in accordance with the rites, practices, discipline, and liturgical norms of the Catholic Church.

### **3. Responsibility**

#### **(a) Governance**

The governors, as guardians of the Catholic school’s life and mission, have a responsibility to ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- there is a named person(s) who is responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school (the Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator)
- the prayer and liturgy policy is updated regularly and shared with all stakeholders
- there is a budget for prayer and liturgy that reflects its centrality to the life of a Catholic school.

#### **(b) Headteacher**

The headteacher, as the spiritual leader of the school as a Catholic community, ensures that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- they work in partnership with the leader(s) for prayer and liturgy
- those responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school have been given appropriate training and formation to ensure that all guidance is followed and adhered to
- there are suitable resources for prayer and liturgy in the school.



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### (c) Prayer and Liturgy Leader

Those responsible for prayer and liturgy ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- there is an ***Annual Plan of Provision (appendix 2)*** for prayer and liturgy across the school year which identifies liturgical seasons and key celebrations, as well as opportunities for the celebration of the Sacraments
- there is daily planned prayer for all pupils, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the Prayer progression Directory (appendix 3)
- pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy are appropriate and readily available to staff and pupils
- induction on prayer and liturgy takes place for new members of staff as required
- staff have access to effective training and formation opportunities
- monitoring and evaluation of prayer and liturgy take place regularly and feed back into planning for future liturgies
- monitoring of prayer and liturgy is reported to the headteacher and governing body to support whole-school development and the Catholic life of the school
- there is collaboration with local clergy and parishes
- liaison with the Diocesan Advisory Service and others is maintained to ensure they keep updated with best practice.

### (d) All staff

Teaching staff are responsible for:

- prayer and liturgy being central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the Prayer and Liturgy Directory
- following the ***Annual Plan of Provision (appendix 2)*** for prayer and liturgy across the school year
- ensuring there is daily planned prayer for all pupils in their care, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the ***Prayer progression Directory (appendix 3)***
- that pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- ensuring they have resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy and in class Spiritual areas follow the guidance (see appendix 4).



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### 4. Overview of prayer and liturgy provision

In this section of the policy, an overview of the provision (appendix 5) is given. It will outline when prayer and liturgy take place, and the daily and weekly pattern of prayer and liturgy offered in the school. It will also include when Mass is celebrated across the year, when there are opportunities for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and when there are special liturgies. This section of the policy is similar to but less detailed than the Annual Plan of Provision. The Annual Plan of Provision (appendix 2) will include, for example, dates, who is responsible, and much more detail.

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4a. Pupils are supported in their liturgical formation enabling them to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity. Teachers make use of Holy Cross Planning document for pupil led Celebrations of The Word (appendix 6) to guide planning and give children time to prepare prayer and liturgy each week. Faith Council take an active role in whole school prayer and liturgy as well as monitoring class-based pupil led prayer and liturgy offering support and guidance.

### **5. Resourcing**

Prayer and liturgy are central to the school’s understanding of itself as a Catholic school, and this is reflected in the annual budget allocation and available resources, including staff time, chaplaincy provision, and dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy. The Catholic character of the school is reflected in religious artefacts and images on display throughout the building. Dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy will be furnished and maintained as such and updated to reflect the Church’s liturgical season. Staff training and formation costs will be funded separately to ensure that all staff are able to fulfil their responsibility to contribute to the prayer and liturgical life of the school. All classes have Spiritual Areas for which the teachers are given guidance (see appendix 4)

### **6. Training and formation**

All new staff will be supported during induction and beyond, so that they fully understand the responsibility they carry within their individual role for leading prayer and liturgy in the school. Any individual training needs will be identified and addressed through training and formation. There will also be the opportunity for whole-staff professional development at least once a year, so that all staff understand the importance of prayer and liturgy and relevant staff are well supported to lead as required

### **7. Monitoring and evaluation**

Monitoring and evaluation of the quality and impact of prayer and liturgy will take place regularly, and at least annually, and involve all key stakeholders: pupils, parents, staff, clergy, and governors. Areas for development will be identified and issues raised will be actioned and evidenced as appropriate.

### **8. Review**

The policy will be reviewed as part of the regular cycle of policy review conducted by the governors.

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### Appendix 3

### Prayer Progression directory

In Catechesi Tradendi St Paul VI wrote: “The blossoms, if we may call them that, of faith and piety do not grow in the desert places of a memory-less catechesis. What is essential is that the texts that are memorised must at the same time be taken in and gradually understood in depth, in order to become a source of Christian life on the personal level and the community level.”

This suggests that Catholic pupils not only learn common prayers but are helped to appreciate how each text draws them into a relationship with Jesus, so that these texts become a foundation for their ongoing prayer life. It is important that pupils encounter during their time at school a wide range of prayers. They should have a familiarity with the common texts of the Catholic tradition, but also appreciate that there are many ways of praying and languages of prayer. As the pupils mature and developed so should their prayers and as such Holy Cross have a Progression of Prayers starting from Nursery.

Holy Cross provides each of our families with a prayer book containing the prayers listed below, alongside other prayers such as our class saints' prayers and prayers from our founding sisters of LSU. This prayer book is given to pupils as a gift to be valued and to be used. It is important to know some prayers by heart as well as to know where to turn to express in prayer with the hopes and fears of growing in life and faith.



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# Items used at Mass & Liturgies

## Books



### Sacramentary

Contains the opening prayer, prayer over the gifts, prayer after communion, and solemn blessings. Eucharistic prayers and prefaces for all of the masses including most special occasions.



### Book of the Gospels

Contains only the Gospel readings. It is used on more solemn occasions and is carried by the deacon if it is used.



### Lectionary

Contains the scripture readings for Mass. It is carried in the procession by the lector and placed on the ambo.

### Hymnal/Missalette

Contains all the parts of the mass for a specific season in the liturgical year including instructions on when to stand, sit, or kneel.

## Objects



**Chalice** The large cup used at Mass used to hold the wine which becomes the Blood of Christ.



### Paten

A saucer-like disk which holds the bread which becomes the Body of Christ.



### Ciborium

A vessel used to hold the Hosts which will be used for communion. They are also used to reserve the

Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle.

### Decanter or Flagon

The bottle or pitcher like vessel used to hold the wine which will be consecrated at mass for the communion of the people. It is brought forth with the gifts.

### Communion Cups

Chalice like vessels used at communion when the people receive from the cup. They are kept on the Credence Table and brought to the Altar at communion time.



**Corporal** A white linen cloth on which are placed the vessels containing the bread and wine during Mass which will become the Body and Blood of Christ.



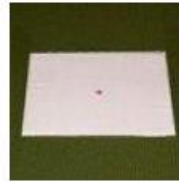
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### Purificator

A white cloth use to cleanse the chalice. It resembles a napkin.



### Pall

The stiff, square, white cover that is placed over the paten when it is on the chalice.



### Tabernacle

The shrine or receptacle either round or rectangular that serves as a place for the exclusive reservation of the Blessed Sacrament. It should be of solid material, opaque, secure and inviolable, fitting the architecture of the church in a prominent place.



### Censor & Boat

The Censor, also known as the Thurible, is used at solemn occasion to incense the bread and wine after the offertory, the priest, and congregation. The Boat holds the incense until it is place in the censor by the celebrant.



### Monstrance

A sacred vessel designed to expose the consecrated Host to the congregation either for adoration in church of carrying in procession, particularly on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ.



### Sanctuary Lamp

An oil lamp or wax candle that burns near the tabernacle. It is always lit whenever the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in churches or chaples as a sign of honour shown to the Lord.



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### ↑ Vestments



#### **Alb**

A long white garment which can be used by all liturgical ministers. It is a reminder of the baptismal garment worn when the new Christian “Put on Christ.”



#### **Cincture**

A long cord used for fastening albs at the waist. It holds the loose-fitting type of alb in place and is used to adjust it to proper length. It is usually white, although the liturgical colour of the day may be used.

### Liturgical Colours for Chasuble, Dalmatic and Stoles

● **Green** - Worn during “Ordinary Time.” Ordinary does not mean ordinary in the sense of common or normal. Ordinary means counting, as in the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

● **Red** - Worn on Passion (Palm) Sunday, Good Friday, Pentecost Sunday, and on the Feast Days of Martyrs including the Apostles and Evangelists.

● **Violet** - Worn during Advent and Lent or at Masses for the dead.

○ **White** - Worn during the Christmas, Easter seasons and celebrations of Mary, the Angels, Saints who were not martyrs, All Saints, Birth of John the Baptist, Chair of Peter, Conversion of Paul, St. John the Evangelist and is the preferred colour for Masses for the dead..

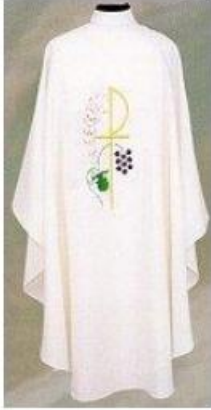
● **Rose** - Worn on the 3rd Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) and the 4th Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday/ Mothering Sunday).

● **Black** - Was traditionally worn at Masses for the dead. Now the preferred colour is White or Violet.



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### Chasuble

The sleeveless outer garment, slipped over the head, hanging down from the shoulders covering the alb and stole of the priest. It is the proper Mass vestment for the main celebrant and its colour varies according to the feast.



### Dalmatic

A loose-fitting robe with open sides and wide sleeves worn by a deacon on more solemn feasts. It takes its colour from the liturgical feast as listed above.



### Priest Stole

A long cloth "scarf." According to the manner in which it is worn it is the mark of the Office of the priest or deacon. A priest wears it around the neck, letting it hang down in front.



### Deacon Stole

A long cloth "scarf." According to the manner in which it is worn it is the mark of the Office of the priest or deacon. A deacon wears it over his left shoulder, fastening it at his right side.



### Cassock

A long black garment worn by Altar Servers under the Surplice. Also worn by Diocesan Priests (Black), Monsignors (Rose), Bishops (Violet), Cardinals (Red), and the Pope (White).



### Surplice

This is a wide-sleeved garment, slipped over the head, covering the shoulders, and coming down below the hips. It is worn over the cassock.
